A Word from the Pastor at Lent

It's not the earliest it can come, but this year Easter will come earlier than it does most years. Easter will fall on April 4th which necessitates the arrival of Ash Wednesday on February 17th. We anticipate this newsletter reaching you the first full week of February and so wanted to include the entire Lenten Schedule in this issue.

Ash Wednesday, February 17th

We will hold two services of worship at Holy Trinity. The first will begin promptly at 12 noon and will be held in the Mansperger Chapel. As has been our custom the past few years, a full sit down luncheon will follow the service (no Lenten noontime worship or lunch will be held the next day). Thursday noontime worship will begin the following week on February 25th. Our evening worship will begin at 7:30 and will be held in the main church with full choir. In keeping with our Lenten theme, Pastor Bang will unwrap the words "kairos and chronos." Should you wish to worship at Parkside Church that day, worship will be held at 12 noon. All services at both Holy Trinity and Parkside are services of Holy Communion and ashes will be distributed at all services for those who wish to receive them.

Thursdays in Lent

Each Thursday in Lent, beginning February 25th, there will be two different worship opportunities offered each week. As has been our custom for many years, our popular noontime devotion begins in the Mansperger Chapel at 12:10 pm. It is followed by a full sit-down luncheon lovingly prepared and served by our dedicated and devoted Lenten Luncheon crew. The program for worship will focus on "Key Words of Faith" and Pastors Buerk, Olsen, Kattermann and Bang will be our preachers. The schedule is as follows:

February 25th – Pastor Bang will unwrap the Greek word "Dikaisune." March 4th – Pastor Olsen will unwrap the Hebrew word "Shuwb" March 11 – Pastor Kattermann will unwrap the word "Logos." March 18 – Pastor Buerk will unwrap the word, "Agape" March 25 – Pastor Olsen will unwrap the Greek word, "Koinonia"



Thursday Evenings, beginning February 25th, will find us gathering for a delicious dinner of soup and bread, continuously served from 5:30pm until 7:00 pm. (providers are still needed, please call the church office at 886-2400 and talk with Chuck Rojek if you are willing to help!)

At 7:00 pm we are joined by our magnificent choir in our main sanctuary for a half hour Vespers service. This meditative, musical service will serve to quiet your mind and afford you a moment of peace and a time for prayer and reflection. We adjourn following worship for dessert and conversation. This year, your pastors are offering a 5 week study entitled, "Late Night Catechism." We will work our way through the catechism in a new and "fun" way and hope you will join us for this experiment in learning. Those who have never been confirmed, and who attend all five sessions, will also have the opportunity to celebrate their first (or renewed) confirmation at the Great Vigil of Easter. The topics are as follows:

Week One "Rules to Live By"
Week Two "God, can we talk?"

Week Three "Good News in a Nutshell" Week Four "Can I borrow the keys?" Week Five "Why only Two?"

Holy Week

Our Holy Week observances begin with Palm Sunday and two services of worship at our regular schedule times of 8:30 am and 10:30 am.

Each Morning in Holy Week (Mon-Fri)

Morning Devotions at 7:00, held in the Mansperger Chapel, will be followed by breakfast in the Fellowship Room. A great way to start each day. Devotions and breakfast combined will still have you on your way to work or your daily commitments by 8:00am.

Maundy Thursday

Two services of worship will be offered on Maundy Thursday, the first at 11:45 am will be held in the Mansperger Chapel and will conclude with lunch served in the Parish Hall (see Menu).

Our evening service returns at 7:30 pm with full choir in our main sanctuary. Our worship contains the essential elements of footwashing, individual absolution, and Holy Communion.

Good Friday

Our service of Tenebrae will be held in the main Church with full choir beginning at 7:30 pm.

Holy Saturday

The Great Vigil of Easter will be held at Holy Trinity church this year, beginning at 8:00 pm. It will begin outdoors and proceed into the Mansperger Chapel concluding in the main church with Holy Communion and the Affirmation of Baptism for all, including our adult confirmands. (See Thursday evening programming for more details.)

Easter Morning

Two festival services of Holy Communion will be offered on this holy day at 8:30 am and 10:30 am. Both services will be held in the main church. Preservice music will be offered by our choir and organist James Bigham beginning promptly at 9:45am.

Lenten Worship and Programming at Parkside Church

Our relationship with Parkside Church (2 Wallace Avenue) continues and we wanted to let you know of the Lenten opportunities we will present there.

All Sunday worship services at Parkside begin at 9:30 am.

Ash Wednesday Service will be held at 12 noon. Ashes will be distributed and Holy Communion will be offered.

Mid week in Lent. We will gather for a simple dinner of soup and bread each Wednesday evening beginning February 24th at 6:00 pm. At 7:00, Pastor Bang will lead us on a Lenten journey through the life of Christ, using the highly acclaimed series, "First Light, Jesus and the Kingdom of God" a DVD based study (filmed in high definition) that leads us through the places and people in Jesus' life and ministry along with significant scholarly input from two of today's leading Jesus scholars, Dr. Marcus Borg and Dr. John Dominic Crossan. Conversation and dessert will follow. The study should conclude by 8:30 pm. This is the same study Pastor Bang led in his Monday morning bible study class at Holy Trinity.

Maundy Thursday the congregation of Parkside Church is invited to join the Holy Trinity family for worship at Holy Trinity, either at 11:45 am or in the evening at 7:30 pm.

Good Friday worship at Parkside will be the service of Tenebrae beginning at 7:30 pm.

The Great Vigil of Easter (Saturday) will be held this year at Holy Trinity beginning at 8:00 pm.

The Festival of the Resurrection (Easter Sunday) will be celebrated at Parkside at 9:30 am. A congregational Easter breakfast will follow.

Biblical Advice for Cheerful Givers

We've been told this since our days in Sunday school: We need to give and we need to give gladly. But a spirit of generosity isn't enough to guide us in our decisions. What else does Scripture have to say on the subject?

Three kinds of financial giving are mentioned in the Bible: offerings, tithes and alms. Understanding what they mean helps us achieve a thoughtful, balanced plan for our cheerful giving.

Each of you must give
as you have made up
your mind, for God loves
a cheerful giver.
(2 Corinthians 9:7)

Offerings and Tithing

On the first day of every week, each of you is to put aside and save whatever extra you earn, so that collections need not be taken when I come (1 Corinthians 16:2).

The faith practice of making a regular financial offering to your congregation is grounded in a "first fruits" biblical principle. Your generosity is not an afterthought; it's part of your day-in-and-day-out joyful response as a child of God.

Tithing includes all undesignated giving and supports local ministries and outreach. Your congregation then shares a portion of your tithe—mission support—with your synod and the churchwide expression. *Stories of Faith in Action* is filled with examples of how God changes people's lives through mission support. It is God's work with our hands.

Offerings refer to giving that is above and beyond, and never in place of, your commitment to regular congregational giving, which many Christians talk about as a tithe. This helps you to differentiate between your financial commitment to your congregation and the special offerings you designate to specific causes. Such causes may include World Hunger, a program unit of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, a congregation's building fund or a pan-Lutheran organization such as Lutheran World Relief. We encourage your designated support of these worthy causes.

Alms

Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys (Luke 12:33).

Alms are our compassionate, heartfelt response to the people Jesus mentioned in Matthew 25: those "least" of our sisters and brothers who are "less" than we in circumstance only and always our equal in their humanity.

This is our most personal and spontaneous kind of giving in response to people in need. Think about the homeless man you see everyday by the bus stop or the family in your congregation whose home was lost during a fire. Your outreach makes God's love for them feel very real and very immediate; your kindness reveals Christ's presence within them as well.

Time and Talent

It's also important to remember that when we focus exclusively on giving in terms of money alone, we lose sight of the bigger picture. God calls us to be generous in all areas our lives and invites us to explore the many opportunities to share ourselves through our time and talent.

When we ground our giving in a biblical context, our financial generosity becomes an expression of our love for God, for our neighbor and for ourselves. We are new people in Christ: compassionate and eager to share.

We give cheerfully because God has given us so much.



A Financial Expression of Faith


A budget accounts for the resources an organization uses to fulfill its vision. But for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), our budget does something more. It begins to tell the story of peoples' lives transformed, of God's boundless love shared with the world. It's the financial expression of our faith.

Guided by five strategic priorities, the churchwide budget sustains our work as we: support congregations; grow in evangelical outreach; step forward as a public church; deepen and extend our global, ecumenical and interfaith relationships; and bring forth and support faithful, wise and courageous leaders.

The ministries featured in *Stories of Faith in Action* are not funded by a single line item of the budget. Rather they are made possible by many programs supported by the budget and carried out through partnerships among the three expressions of this church.

For example, a new congregation doesn't begin within a groundbreaking ceremony. It starts much earlier with the development of leaders who are formed by a strong, healthy educational system from preschool to seminary. Early research and training conducted by churchwide and synod staff are the ground work needed to pick the right location and leaders. Relationship building among leaders of congregations, synods and the churchwide organization provide a firm foundation. And a commitment for ongoing funding from the three expressions ensures a successful future.

Simply put, our ministry starts with a promise that, in collaboration, we will do God's work together. Thank you for your continued support.



Mission support funds more than 80% of the churchwide budget revenue, and it continues to be the single most important source of income for our shared ministry.

In 2008, members of 10,396 ELCA congregations gave \$1.94 billion to support God's mission and ministry through the three expressions of the ELCA.

- \$1,811,907,802 (or 93.2%) remained in congregations to fund local ministries
- \$65,211,572 (or 3.4%) was shared to support synodical ministries
- \$65,286,926 (or 3.4%) was sent from synods to support churchwide ministries

Preparing For Emergencies At Church

On Sunday, January 10, twelve Holy Trinity ushers and Sunday school staff were trained and certified in the American Heart Association CPR and Automatic External Defibrillator 4 hour course. Surprisingly only 1% of the US population is trained. Lt. Rick Hanes-Stetter of the EMT Training Division of the Buffalo Fire Dept. was our instructor and everyone felt he did a superb job. Efforts are underway to update first aid equipment and to store it all in the sacristy where it can be obtained easily by ushers at both 8:30 and 10:30 services, as well as the Sunday school and crib room.

If someone has a respiratory or cardiac incident while in church, it was advised to move the person from the pew to the central aisle and to leave plenty of room for the ushers to start CPR and later for the rescue squad to do their job. It also is likely that clothing will need to be cut away so that the chest of the victim is accessible to the first aider. To insure the dignity of the injured, those sitting nearby may be asked to form a circle and then turn around so their backs are toward the victim effectively shielding them. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.
