

Hi Pat!!

My service trip to Erie, Pennsylvania was a very great experience. We stayed at the monastery with sisters where each student was assigned a room. All students had to go to two different work sites everyday, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. This sounds like too much work but it was really fun working with the Erie Community. I had the opportunity to work at the St. Benedict Education Center where sisters help immigrants and refugees learn English. I was able to speak Swahili with some of the people from Africa and helped them with their English assignments. They were very surprised and very happy to see that there was someone with whom they shared something. We worked in the health services at the monastery where they take care of senior sisters. Walking, playing some simple games and talking to these sisters always brought a warm smile on their face. We had the opportunity to serve in a soup kitchen, and the people who came were very thankful. I even remember this man who told us "Jesus Loves You." We also worked in some of the offices at the monastery and at an Art house where children are helped so that they can discover or improve different talents that they have.

PROSTATE CANCER

The body is made of hundreds of millions of living cells. Normal cells grow, divide and die in an orderly way. During the early years of a person's life, normal cells divide faster to allow the person to grow. After the person becomes an adult, most cells divide only to replace worn out, damaged, or dying cells.

Cancer begins when cells in a part of the body start to grow out of control. Cancer cell growth is different from normal cell growth. Instead of dying, cancer cells keep on growing and form new cancer cells. These cells can grow into (invade) other tissues, something that normal cells cannot do. Being able to grow out of control and invade other tissues is what makes a cell a cancer cell. These cancer cells form a tumor but some cancers, like leukemia, rarely form tumors. When cancer cells get into the bloodstream or lymph vessels, they can travel to other parts of the body and begin to grow and form new tumors. This process is called metastasis. Not all tumors are cancerous. Tumors that aren't cancer are called benign. They cannot grow into other tissues and cannot spread into other parts of the body. These tumors are almost never life threatening.

No matter where a cancer may spread, it is always named for the place where it started. Prostate cancer that has spread to the bone is called metastatic prostate cancer, not bone cancer.

WHAT IS PROSTATE CANCER?

This gland is found only in men and is just below the bladder and in front of the rectum. It is about the size of a walnut. The tube that carries urine (urethra) runs through the prostate. In older men, the part of the prostate around the urethra may keep on growing which can lead to benign prostates hyperplasia (BPH) which can cause problems with passing urine. This is a problem that must be treated but it is not cancer. Most of the time, prostate cancer grows slowly.

WHAT CAUSES PROSTATE CANCER?

This cancer is caused by change in the DNA of a prostate cancer cell. DNA makes up our genes, which control how cells behave. DNA is inherited from our parents. Small percentages (5-10%) of prostate cancers are linked to these inherited changes. We do know that certain risk factors are linked to the disease. A risk factor is anything that increases a person's chance of getting a disease.

Risk factors for prostate cancer

Age: The chance of getting prostate cancer increases after a man reaches age 50.

Almost 2 out of every 3 prostate cancers are found in men over the age of 65.

Race: Prostate is more common in African-American men than in men of other races.

Nationality: Prostate cancer is most common in North America and in northwestern

Europe. The reason for this is not clear.

Family History: Prostate cancer seems to run in the family.

Genes: Scientists have found some inherited genes that seem to raise prostate cancer risk, but they account for only a small number of cases overall.

Diet: The exact role of diet is not clear, but some have factors have been studied. Eating a lot of red meat or high fat dairy products seems to have a greater chance of getting prostate cancer.

Obesity: Being obese (having a high amount of extra body fat) is linked with a higher risk of getting prostate cancer.

Exercise: Exercise has not been shown to reduce prostate cancer risk in most studies. But some studies have found that high levels of physical activity, particularly in older men, may lower the risk of advanced prostate cancer. More research is needed in this area.

blood. Also, it can be found early when the doctor does a digital rectal exam (DRE). Because the prostate gland lies just in front of the rectum, during the DRE the doctor can feel if there are any bumps or hard places on the prostate.

The American Cancer Society does not recommend routine prostate cancer screening for all men. ACS believes that doctors should discuss the pros and cons of testing with men so each man can decide if testing is right for him. The test should include a PSA blood test and a DRE yearly, beginning at age 50 for men at average risk who can be expected to live for another 10 years. For men at higher risk, this discussion should take place at age 45. High risk men include African American men and men who have a close relative (father, brother or son) who had prostate cancer before age 65.

HOW IS PROSTATE CANCER TREATED?

Surgery Radiation Therapy Chemo Therapy

Cryosurgery (freezing) Hormone Therapy

Generally speaking the treatment you choose should take into account:

Your age and how long you can expect to live

Any other serious health problems you may have

The stage and grade of your cancer

Your feelings (and your doctor's opinion) about the need to treat the cancer

Your feelings about the side effects common with each treatment

WHAT ARE SOME QUESTIONS I CAN ASK MY DOCTOR?

Please write down the exact type of cancer I have.

May I have a copy of my pathology report?

What is the chance that the cancer has spread beyond my prostate? If so, is it curable?

What other tests do you think I need and why?

Is watchful waiting (active surveillance) an option for me?

What is the clinical stage of my cancer and what does that mean?

What treatments are available and what might be best for me?

What are the risks or side effects among those treatments?

What are the chances I will have problems with incontinence or impotence?

What are the chances that I will have other urinary or rectal problems?

What are the chances of the cancer coming back with the treatment you suggest?

What would be our next step if this happened?

What is my expected survival rate based on clinical stage, grade, and various treatment options?
