A Word from the Pastor During Pentecost


Last month I was invited to be the Chaplain at the Chautauqua Institution. I started as a mid week fill-in in 1996 and over the years have served as institutional chaplain five times. For those of you who are not familiar with Chautauqua, the Institution, though open all year, really only functions at full capacity and full tilt during the summer months, when they sponsor nine weeks of intense programming, with nationally known lecturers, musicians, traveling troupes, ballet, theater, film and so much more. Each of the nine weeks has its own theme and all the lectures, music, etc. centers around that theme.

The theme of the week I was there was "Cuba: Neighbor and Enigma." The entire week was sponsored by the Department of Religion as its Department Chair, Dr. Joan Brown Campbell, has had a long history of interacting with this island nation and its people. Some may recall the Elian Gonzales story of a few years ago. As a result of her involvement in and affection for Cuba and Cubans, all of the lecturers, presenters, as well as some of the music, authors and food for the week were chosen and invited by her and as a delightful consequence, I, as chaplain for the week, along with my wife, Debby, got to spend most of our time with the Cuban delegation. It was a rare treat to be able to interact with these folks and get to know them in a way we wouldn't have been able to, had the Religion Department not been so closely involved. We met a member of Parliament, an architect working on the revival of Old Havana, we met a Presbyterian pastor working with the World Council of Churches in the Caribbean and specifically with Cuba, we met a Cuban Chef, an American historian who has devoted her life to telling the story of Cuba and working with our government to improve relations with our closest island neighbor. We learned the true story about Castro's Revolution, why it happened, how it happened, the consequences thereof. We learned details about the Bay of Pigs incident and the Cuban missile crisis that we could not glean from books. We were given insight into the lives of Cubans today, about their economic plight, how the recent hurricanes devastated their country, how our trade and travel embargo really effects that nation and its people. And we made close friends in a relatively short period of time.

The sermons I preached were all based on the scriptures and the theme of neighbor. I preached a sermon on a text from Genesis and the story of Cain and Abel. I drew on stories from the Christian New Testament and the parables of Jesus; the story of the Good Samaritan, the persistent neighbor, the questioning of Jesus by the Pharisees about which commandment was the greatest, and the touching story about a group of friends who loved their companion so much that they were willing to dig through the roof of Jesus' home to get help for their friend. I did (hopefully) a credible job of integrating what I learned that week into my preaching and we have published the set for you to take home. You should find copies in the narthexes of the church and chapel. You can also find them online at our website, www.holytrinitybuffalo.org. Chautauqua also has them available for download as an audio file (recordings of the sermons as I delivered them at Chautauqua). There is a small fee to do this. Simply go to the Great Lecture Library at the Chautauqua web site, www.ciweb.org. You can also pin me down some day and I would be glad to talk to you.

Swine Flu (H1N1)

I have been at my computer for several hours researching this topic. I know this article is long, but I wanted to present the facts about this flu so you will be an educated consumer. I have researched the National Institute of Health, The World Health Organization, the Center for Disease Control, and the National Vaccine Information Center, a non for profit organization that is the watchdog for vaccinations.

Swine Flu (H1N1) is a respiratory infection caused by a virus. It is transmitted by coughing, sneezing, and/or touching an object that has been touched by someone who has the flu. It can be spread by air and enters your body through your nose or mouth and also by hand to nose or mouth. It is imperative you avoid touching your nose or mouth and wash, wash, wash, your hands as often as possible. It is suggested you wash your hands with soap and water while singing Happy Birthday twice. You can also use an alcohol based antibacterial hand wash solution. You can buy these in small containers at the dollar store, grocery store or drug store. I carry one in my purse and one in my car.

The vaccine is egg based, so if you are allergic to eggs you do not want to receive the vaccine.

Symptoms include chills, fever, cough, headache, body aches, sore throat, and runny nose; all similar to the regular flu.

An antiviral treatment can be given to treat or prevent the spreading of the Swine Flu.

It can be given to one who just became sick (within 2 days)

It can be given to one who is already ill, thus decreasing the sick time and decreasing the symptoms

It can be given to a well person who has been in contact with a sick person

Receiving the treatment doesn't prevent the flu if you have been in contact with a sick person, but it decreases your chance of catching the flu and decreases the chance of passing it on to others

Testing of a vaccine by the National Institute of Health began in July and manufacturers of the vaccine also have been testing the vaccine. Adults and the elderly have been tested as well as children 6 months -17 years. It seems that they tested the adults and elderly first. Then when that was favorable and safe, they approved the testing of children. The components of the vaccine are very controversial. Of the sites I researched, some say the vaccine is safe, while others were concerned about the safety and the side effects of the vaccine. You will have to discuss this with your doctor and weigh the risks vs. benefits.

There are 5 groups who will receive the vaccine first if they so choose:

- 1. Health care and emergency workers.
- 2. Pregnant women

3. Children and young adults ages 6 months to 24 years.

- 4. Parents and caretakers of babies under 6 months.
- 5. Adults 25-64 with chronic conditions. i.e. lung disease, asthma, heart disease and diabetes, etc.

A further note on vaccines. In 2005 congress took away liability for experimental drugs and vaccines that are released for public use under emergency use authorization whenever a national public health emergency is declared. There has been no funding of a compensation project for children or adults injured or killed by vaccines or drugs used under emergency use authorization.

What you have to do now is become informed about this flu. Read what you can, ask your doctor questions about this vaccine and if it is something you should receive. Each case is different and you and your doctor must decide what is best for you and your family. If you have access to a computer contact the following sites: www.CDC (Center for Disease Control), www.flu. gov, www.WHO, (World Health Organization), www.NVIC.org (National Vaccine Information Center), www.NIH (National Institute of Health), and in New York State H1N1 hotline (24/7) 1-800-808-1987. In NYS Governor Patterson has declared that your insurance company must cover the cost of the vaccine with no co-pay, no co-insurance and no annual deductible.

So now this is what we have to do:

- 1. Stay informed. Be an educated consumer and weigh the risks vs. benefits.
- 2. Avoid touching your nose and mouth.
- 3. Avoid close contact with people who are ill.

4. Wash your hands with soap and water and sing Happy Birthday times 2 or use alcohol based hand wash. Carry antibacterial alcohol hand wash in your car and purse.

- 5. Decrease time spent in crowded situations.
- 6. Practice good health. i.e. adequate sleep, eat nutritional foods, keep physically fit.
- 7. Talk with your MD. You and he/she will keep you and your loved ones healthy.

Holy Trinity Concert Season

The iconic "birthday" of the Lutheran faith is the Feast of the Reformation, which we always observe on the last Sunday of October: this year, Sunday, October 25. This time, we are truly "doing it up" appropriately. The Western New York Chamber Orchestra, Glen Cortese conducting, the Concert Choir of Holy Trinity Church; the elite choruses of Amherst Central High School, Justin Pomietlarz, director; and Mary Kay Atlas, soprano; Melissa Thorburn, alto; Boris Van Druff, tenor; and Brian Zunner, bass, will be performing the "Reformation Cantata" *Cantata* 80, of Sebastian Bach at Holy Trinity Church on Saturday, October 24 at 8:00 p.m., and Reformation Sunday, October 25, at 4:00 p.m. at King Conce at S.U.N.Y. Fredonia. Ticket prices are \$10.00 for adults, \$5.00 for students and free for age 12 and below.

Cantata 80 of J.S. Bach has to be one of the most spectacularly imposing works ever composed by the great Lutheran writer. Every movement contains the "national anthem" of Lutheranism, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." There will be audience participation in the simple, but sublime peroration of the final movement.

Roll Over up to \$100,000 From an IRA to Charities Without Paying Taxes!

Over the past thirty years, IRAs have encouraged American workers to save for retirement. But IRAs that grow tax-deferred are eventually heavily taxed, and the IRS may take up to 65% of the IRAs value. However, naming a charity such as Holy Trinity Lutheran Church as a beneficiary of your IRA will put the full amount to work, making a difference in people's lives today.

As part of the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008, the IRA Charitable Rollover has been extended through the calendar year 2009. If you are 70¹/₂ or older, this extension permits you to roll over funds from an IRA directly to a qualifying charity such as Holy Trinity Lutheran Church without paying taxes on your distributions.

The term "qualified charitable distribution" describes a rollover to an eligible charitable organization from an IRA. An individual may exclude up to \$100,000 from his/her gross income for such distributions. Because this provision applies to every individual IRA holder, a husband and wife who both meet the minimum age threshold of $70\frac{1}{2}$ could effectively move \$200,000 out of their taxable estate in 2009.

Generally, the IRA rollover transfer generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you receive the benefit even if you do not itemize your tax deductions. You may split up the donation among several charities if you don't want to gift \$100,000 to just one organization.

This extended provision is time limited, and expires on December 31, 2009, so please act quickly to take advantage of this opportunity.

All transfers must come directly from traditional IRAs or Roth IRAs to the charity. If you have retirement funds in a 401(k), 403(b), etc., you must first roll those funds into an IRA, and then direct the IRA administrator to transfer funds from the IRA directly to the charity. Distribution may not be used to fund a charitable gift annuity, charitable remainder trust, or to obtain goods or services.

To initiate an IRA charitable rollover, simply contact your IRA administrator and direct them to make the contribution directly. Please make sure that you also let Holy Trinity Lutheran Church know when to expect your gift and how you would like it designated.

As with any decision involving your financial or estate plans, we urge you to seek the advice of professional counsel when considering a gift.
